16TH NATIONAL CLIENT CONSULTING COMPETITION 2015



COMPETITION FORMAT

1. The Competition: - Each team consisting of two student participants would be allotted a room for the interview and counselling. Here the two student participants will conduct themselves as advocates in a lawyer's chamber. The client will be a person trained by the organisers and would consult you with a problem. The student participants are given a brief written memorandum that identifies the general nature of the subject-matter of the client's problem (e.g., that a client wants advice in his matrimonial issues, inheritance of property etc.) 15 days before the interviews/preliminary rounds are held. The two participants are required to elicit all relevant information from the client by interviewing or questioning the client and then counsel the client, outline the nature of the problem, explore with the client his or her preferred outcome, and present the client with a means (or range of alternatives, if appropriate) for resolving the problem.
2. All teams will be pre-assigned a letter designation (A.B.C. etc.) by the organisers by picking of lots.

The Session: - All teams will go through a 40 minute Session. The Session must include both a Consultation Session (30 Minutes) with the client and a Post-Consultation Session (10 Minutes).

- a) **The Consultation Session (Interview Period).** The first 30 minutes are devoted to a consultation with the client during which students are expected to elicit the relevant information, outline the problem and propose a solution or other means of resolving the

problem (Further information is contained in the Judging Standards for the Client Counselling Competition.)

- b) **Post Consultation Session (Post Interview Period)**. The interview with the client is then followed by a Post-Consultation Session (10 Minutes). Each team must conduct a meaningful post-consultation discussion between the attorneys (team members) after the client has left the room. During this post-consultation, the students may either talk to each other loudly enough to be overheard by the judges or dictate a file memorandum on the interview or both. The post-consultation performance may summarize the interview, indicate the scope of the legal work to be undertaken, and state the legal issues that should be researched. Explanation of the position or attitude taken by the students may be useful. If the students feel that some documents are appropriate, like a letter to the client confirming their retention as attorneys, the fee arrangement etc, or a letter to opposing counsel or to the party with whom the client is having their legal problems, they may dictate such a document at the this stage.

It is up to each team to decide how they will share the work. The work plan is subject to judging, however, the team may wish to use part of this post interview reflection to explain their work plan. The judges may question the team at the end of this period and may use anything learned in this period to assist them in their judging.

3. Use of Materials and Props: - During the consultation and post-consultation, the team may use books, notes, and other materials. The team may also use office props (files, bookshelves, desktop furnishings, etc). During the session the teams will not be allowed to use any electronic device, like laptop ,LCD projectors, video camera, mobile phones etc and such use will lead to disqualification. The students participants can also use any books during the Session. The Competition organizer will endeavor to provide water and facial tissues on the desk.

4. The Judges and the teams will agree the starting time for the interview. The team will be responsible for its own time keeping during the interview. The organisers will arrange their own time keepers
5. Subject of the problems will be based on the **Law of Domestic Violence, Law of Contract, Law of Tort and Law of Copyright.**
6. After all the teams have finished their sessions, the judges in each group shall privately consult in order to evaluate the teams. The client may at this time be invited to participate in the consultation, but his/her opinion should not be determinative.
7. Client Not to Be Present: - Clients should not be present during the post-consultation period or the critique.
8. The students are evaluated against specific criteria that emphasize the use of listening, questioning, planning, and analytical skills in a lawyer/client interview.
9. Approximately 15 days before the first day of the Competition (27-10-2015), the Competition organizer will send to each team the memoranda briefly describing the consultation situations for the Competition. These memoranda will contain information similar to that which a law office secretary might record when informing lawyers of a forthcoming appointment.
10. The discussion of fees is an integral part of any first consultation between a lawyer and a client. Students should be judged on how they approach this problem, but not on the monetary amount used. The participants may discuss fees at any appropriate point in the consultation. Fees may be waived or suitably reduced only in cases of financial hardship, either for persons of low income or for persons of ordinary income faced with very large fees.
11. The Judges may penalize students who allow the Consultation Session to run excessively beyond the 30 minute period allotted. However the judges in their discretion, taking into account the circumstances, may allow some

more time beyond the 30 minute period for the Consultation Session. If the extended consultation session allowed an opportunity for a team to gather more information than other teams, this circumstance should be taken into consideration by the judges in making their decision. If the thirty (30) minute Consultation Session is exceeded, in no circumstances will the students be given more than 40 minutes to complete both tasks (Consultation & Post Consultation). Judges should stop students after 40 minutes regardless of whether the students are in the consultation or post-consultation process.

12. There will be four rounds namely two preliminary rounds, semi-final and final rounds. From both the preliminary rounds, six teams with the highest number of points will be qualified to participate in the semi-final round. Two teams, with the highest number of points in the semi-final rounds will be qualified to participate in the final round. The final round will be in one room with one panel of judges. After the judges have seen all the teams' performance, they should discuss each team's performance among themselves. Judges are encouraged to consult the client. The judges can discuss with the teams regarding their performance. Then judges will individually rank the teams.
