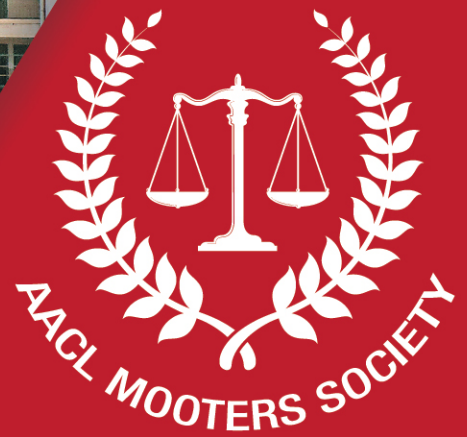
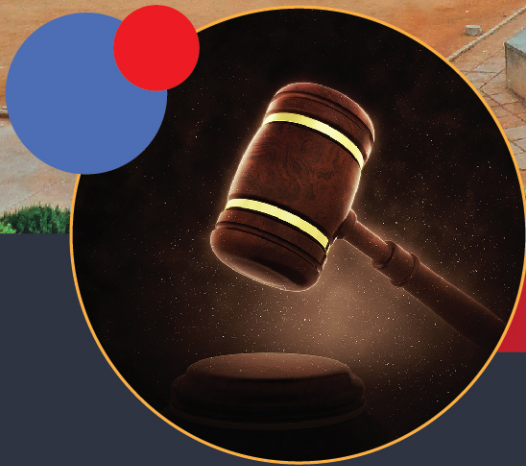

MOOT PROPOSITION

1. Bharath, officially the Republic of Bharath (herein after known as RoB), is a country in South Asia. It is the seventh-largest country by area, the second-most populous country (with over 1.2 billion people) and the most populous democracy in the world. Bharath ranks third among the most attractive investment destinations for technology transactions in the world having had a strong focus on science and technology, realising that it is a key element of economic growth. It is among the topmost countries in the world in the field of scientific research, and it ranks third among the most attractive investment destinations for technology transactions in the world. RoB ranks second in terms of contribution to high-quality scientific research. It is among the world's top 10 nations in the number of scientific publications.
2. Malaipur, the capital city of RoB, is the fastest growing city as it is the habitant of the most soaring tech industries. Malaipur city is also the domicile of most of RoB's leading scientific institutions.
3. Florey Research Institute (herein after known as FRI), is an independent centre of Bharath Council Medical Research (Govt. Undertaking), one of the leading research institution, which conducts genetic and genome research. FRI had conducted many groundbreaking DNA researches which were aiming at changing the world and its health forever. FRI was the proud holder of many patents in the field of biotechnology.
4. FRI created a vaccine which could eradicate major non-genetic diseases. The research involves the scientists isolating the genes that produce powerful antibodies against certain diseases and then synthesize artificial versions. The genes are then placed into viruses and injected into human tissue, usually in muscle. The viruses invade human cells with their DNA payloads, and the synthetic gene is incorporated into the recipient's own DNA thereby changing the genetic makeup of humans permanently and also passing it on to the future generations. FRI conducted clinical trials on the lab-mouse and monkeys after getting permission from the ethical committee. This DNA vaccine was called as the "Golden Bullet". DNA vaccines offers simple yet effective means of inducing broad-based immunity; it protects the recipients against cancer, tuberculosis, HIV, anthrax, influenza, malaria, dengue, typhoid and other communicable diseases. FRI filed for a patent in the year 2003 for "The Golden Bullet" before the Patent Office of RoB which was subsequently granted bearing the Registration Number 664777.
5. In the year 2005 FRI invented the germ line gene editing technique called Hyponeuclic Genome Theropia (hereinafter called as HnGT). HnGT is a DNA cutting protein, guided by an RNA molecule that is able to find the specific gene of interest. It is a kind of search and



replace tool used to alter DNA. HnGT includes a gene snipping enzyme and a guide molecule that can be programmed to target unique combinations of the DNA letters A, G, C and T; get these ingredients into the cell and they will cut and modify the genome at the targeted sights. By editing the DNA of the embryo using HnGT, it could be possible to correct genes with disorder and pass those genetic fixes on to future generations. This particular invention of FRI was revolutionary in the world of biomedical; the invention could cure major genetic disorders and also could be used to design babies with desired traits. This was granted patent bearing the registration number 836006.

6. Mr. Raghavan, the head scientists in the genetic research dept of FRI, had done in-depth study and research in genetic disorders that are caused by a change, or mutation, in an individual's DNA sequence. With a very large population and high birth rate, and consanguineous marriage favoured in many communities, there is a high prevalence of genetic disorders in RoB. An estimated 495,000 infants with congenital malformations, 390,000 with G6PD deficiency, 21,400 with Down syndrome, 9,000 with β -thalassaemia, 5,200 with sickle cell disease, and 9,760 with amino acid disorders are born each year. These genetic diseases can impair a person's life forever. Mr. Raghavan who understood the consequences of these genetic disorders aimed at eradicating genetic disorders.
7. With this aim Mr. Raghavan approached a fertility centre in the name of Santaana Fertility Research Centre (hereinafter known as SFRC). These two discussed the benefits of the research work and how it would bring about changes in the world through eradication of allergies, diseases and genetic disorder which would make human race free from any kind of impediments and also about the capacity of the research to create highly intellectual designer human beings who could be tomorrow's leaders and scientists.
8. FRI in association with SFRC, established "Cradles" fertility clinics in the major cities of RoB. They advertised in the media and local newspapers stating "*Cradles, a dedicated centre for Assisted Reproduction and Fertility Treatments is a place where the dream of parenthood comes true. Be it male or female infertility problems, our cumulative experience and expertise can go a long way in helping you complete your family at a very minimal cost. Appropriate follow up care will be done free of charge*"
9. As many as 110 childless couples approached Cradles, established at different cities. 70% of couples responding to the advertisement were found to be qualified for the services so long as an agreement was signed which read as follows, "*We (names of couple) understand that Cradles will provide fertility services at minimal cost. In the event of an unfortunate miscarriage, we understand that Cradles may, at their election, may use biological and genetic material resulting from the miscarriage for the purposes determined by Cradles to*



be in the interest of science or otherwise useful or beneficial. We understand that we may not now, nor at any future time, claim any interest in the scientific or business of Cradles or any associated enterprises.”

10. These 77 couples underwent thorough medical check-ups. The “Golden Bullet” vaccines were then given to the women on the pretext of it producing healthy eggs. The couple were asked to visit cradle again after a period of 10 weeks for exclusive medical check up which included DNA screening. After this check up, it was found that around 45 people had genetic disorder or were hereditary carrier from their birth.
11. Cradles collected the samples (i.e., egg and sperm sample) of all the 77 couples. The collected sample was sent to the lab where it is prepared for IVF. Once the egg was fertilised by a sperm, by using HnGT the embryos which were found to have genetic disorder or were hereditary carrier were tweaked to make them free from such genetic disorders and were also given high IQ, 20/20 vision and muscle power to the unborn. The healthy embryos were also treated the same way. The tweaked embryos were then administered into the womb of the mothers. The mothers were asked to come for the check-up regularly.
12. Meanwhile, Richie Bio-tech Research Institute (Hereinafter called as RBRI) located in Malaipur, filed for revocation of patents on 21/08/2008 before the IPAB on the following grounds:
 - The Golden Bullet, held by FRI, on the ground contending that the invention is contrary to or injurious to public health.
 - The HnGT on the ground that the subject of the claim is not a patentable invention.
13. The IPAB after hearing both the parties revoked the patents. Aggrieved by the decision of the IPAB, the FRI appealed to the Hon’ble High Court of Malaipur contending that the Patent No. 664777 cannot be invalidated because the vaccine, by altering the DNA it prevents potentially fatal disease and Patent No. 836006 cannot be held non-patentable as this gene mutation is in the nature of preventing genetic disease and ethical view point should not cease the advancement of bio technology. The Hon’ble High Court of Malaipur reversed the decision of IPAB. RBRI challenging the decision of Hon’ble High Court of Malaipur appealed to the Hon’ble Supreme Court of RoB.
14. The Cradles regularly followed up with the pregnant mothers and periodical scans including Anomaly scan were conducted. In the Anomaly scan 48 foetuses were found to be abnormal. Unhappy with the result of abnormal foetuses FRI and SFRC had decided to do elective abortion.



15. The mothers were informed that the complication would arise if they continue the pregnancy and free abortion services and follow up care was provided which included 48 hours clinic stay. Counselling was provided for women who expressed emotional discomfort after receiving an abortion.
16. Several women were comforted with the statement indicating that science will benefit from their own misfortune. These women were not informed of the uses to which their aborted foetus and placenta were put.
17. FRI and SFRC sold these aborted foetuses and placentas to various leading cosmetic companies throughout RoB. These aborted foetuses and placentas were used to make processed skin cell protein for anti-ageing cream, products, make-up and lotions. By the selling of foetuses and placentas FRI and SFRC grossed crores of money.
18. Pro-Rights NGO is a non-profit organization situated in Malaiapur. It has often been the champion of human rights, they conduct research and generate action to prevent and end grave abuses of human rights and demand justice for those whose rights has been violated. Through one such researches Pro-Rights comes to know various leading cosmetic brands are utilizing the tissue cells of aborted foetuses and placentas. After doing a thorough investigation into this matter Pro-Rights found that these foetus and placentas are made available for sale by FRI and SFRC for huge price without the knowledge of concerned couples. Pro-Rights filed a Public Interest Litigation before the Hon'ble Supreme Court of RoB on the following grounds:
 - The abortion is against the law of the state and selling of aborted foetuses and placentas is against public policy and unethical.
 - Coercing or pressurising the mothers to undergo such abortion is morally objectionable.
 - FRI and SFRC are utilizing the foetal products in such a way that demands a market price for the foetal product.
 - The mothers were kept in the dark regarding the usage of the foetus and they weren't properly compensated for such a loss.
 - Usage of such substances in cosmetics is against the regulation laid down for the manufacturing of cosmetics.
19. Mr.Vikram and Mrs.Sowmya, were one of the couple who had approached 'Cradles' and were treated for infertility. Sowmya being a hereditary carrier, her embryo, using HnGT was tweaked to remove its genetic disorder. On her 25th week of her pregnancy, Sowmya



experienced discomfort in her lower abdomen for few days. Her worried husband Vikram, rushed her to his friend Dr. Arjun who was a gynaecologist. After thorough check up and collecting some samples for test, the doctor prescribed her few tablets and sent them home for a complete rest. After 4 days Dr. Arjun asked the couple to meet him to discuss on an important matter regarding Sowmya's pregnancy.

20. The Doctor, after a detailed series of test, revealed that the fertility procedure done by the cradles has disoriented the DNA of the foetus which is endangering the life of the mother and the foetus. Devastated by this news, the couple approached cradles who tried to pacify the couple and collected the reports given by Dr.Arjun on the pretext of looking into the matter immediately. The discontented couple understood that Cradles had deceived them. They approached the Hon'ble Supreme Court of RoB seeking constitutional remedy on the following grounds:

- That the Cradles had done such an act without the consent of the couple.
- Such an act has endangered the life of the mother and the foetus.

21. The Hon'ble Supreme Court of RoB has merged all the above mentioned petitions for final hearing 11th march 2018.

Note:

1. *All the laws of RoB are pari materia to India.*
2. *Participants should frame minimum 3 issues atleast.*

RULES & REGULATIONS

General Rules

- The administrator of the Competition shall be the **AACL Mooters Society, Bangalore.**
- The Competition shall be conducted in accordance with the rules mentioned here under. For the purposes of this competition, it will be presumed that all participants have read and submitted to these rules. The participants are required to comply with the rules and procedures prescribed herein.

1. **DATES OF THE COMPETITION:** 9th to 11th March, 2018

2. **VENUE:**

The National Level Moot Court Competition will be held at Al-Ameen College of Law, Bangalore, Karnataka.

3. **ELIGIBILITY:**

This Competition shall be open to all students pursuing Undergraduate Law Degree Programme (3 Year LL.B. or 5 Year integrated B.A./B.Com/B.B.A./ B.S.L/B.Sc, LL.B.) in any Law College/Law School/University in India.

4. **LANGUAGE:**

The entire proceedings in the competition, written as well as oral, shall be in English only.

5. **TEAM COMPOSITION:**

The maximum number of participants per team shall be restricted to 3 out of which 2 shall be Mooters and 1 shall be Researcher. A team may also consist of only 2 Mooters. Each team will be allotted a team code. The team code shall be sent to the teams through mail after the registration is complete. Teams shall not disclose their identity or of their institution or city during any time of the competition; such disclosure shall invite penalties including disqualification.

6. **DRESS CODE:** The official Dress Code for the Competition is as follows:

- 6.1. Ladies: Black Trousers, White Shirt, Black tie or Black and White Salwar-Kameez with Black Blazer and formal Black Shoes.



- 6.2. Men: Black Trousers, White Shirt, Black tie with Black Blazer and formal Black shoes.

7. REGISTRATION:

- 1.1 The participation shall be restricted to the **first 30 teams** who confirm their participation on *'first come first serve'* basis.
- 1.2 The Registration Fee for the National Moot Court Competition is **Rs. 3000/ (Rs. Three Thousand Only)**.
- 1.3 All the teams are required to make the payment in the form of a Demand Draft, drawn in the name of **PRINCIPAL, AL- AMEEN COLLEGE OF LAW, BANGALORE**.
- 1.4 The participation of the college shall be confirmed only upon the receipt of an e-mail confirming the participation from official e-mail ID of the Principal/ Director/ Vice Chancellor/ Head/ Faculty – in- charge, Moot Court along with the scanned copy of the Demand Draft of Rs. 3000/. (Send the e-mail & scanned copy of the Demand Draft) at aaclmoot@gmail.com on or before **31st January 2018**.
- 1.5 Subsequent to the acknowledgement of the receipt of the soft copy of the Demand Draft by the Administrators, the teams shall be required to send the hard copy of the registration form along with the hard copy of the demand draft on or before **8th February 2018**
- 1.6 The Registration fee shall be non- refundable.
- 1.7 No change in the names of the participants shall be permitted after the receipt of the Registration Form, except at the sole discretion of the Organizers.
- 1.8 The envelope containing the Draft and the Registration Form should mention: "Registration for National Level Moot Court Competition 2018" at the top of the envelope.

8. MEMORIALS:

The following requirements must be strictly followed with respect to submission of Memorandum of Written Submissions. Non- conformities will be liable to penalties while awarding marks thereon.

- 8.1. All Participating teams must submit a soft copy of their memorials for both the sides on or before **25th February 2018 within 11.59.P.M.**
- 8.2. Each team must prepare Memorandum of Written Submissions for both sides to the dispute (Petitioner and Respondent).
- 8.3. Once the Memorials have been submitted, no revisions, supplements, or additions will be allowed; however, teams may carry annexure along with and can submit them in the beginning of each round.
- 8.4. Teams shall send a Soft-Copy of the Memorials in **Adobe PDF** format only, via Email to aaclmoot@gmail.com with the subject “Memorial Submission by Team Code for National Level Moot Court Competition, 2018.
- 8.5. All participating teams shall submit 6 sets of Hard Copy of the Memorials (i.e., 6 for Petitioner and 6 for Respondent) (totally 12 copies) must reach the organizers latest by **1st March 2018** Participants are advised to carry copies of Memorials during the competition for their own perusal.
- 8.6. Non adherence to the rules and late submission of Memorials will attract a penalty of 2 Marks for each day of delay. However, the penalty may be condoned in lieu of advance notification, subject to the approval of the AACL Mooters Society, Bangalore.
- 8.7. The Memorial must Contain the following:
 - a) Cover Page;
 - b) Table of Contents;
 - c) List of Abbreviations;
 - d) Index of Authorities;
 - e) Statement of Jurisdiction;
 - f) Statement of Facts;
 - g) Issues Presented;
 - h) Summary of Arguments;

- i) Arguments in Detail;
- j) Prayer.
- k) Appendix (Optional)

8.8. Each Memorial should not exceed more than 40 A4 pages.

8.9. The Memorials should not contain the name of the participating college in any part thereof. Also, no logo or any mark of identification should be made in the Memorials. Non-compliance with this rule will lead to immediate disqualification.

8.10. The Memorial shall be formatted according to the following specifications:

8.10.1. Typed on standard A4 size page

8.10.2. Font Type: Times New Roman

8.10.3. Font size for Body Text: 12; the text of the written submission must have 1.5. (Double) spacing. Font size for the cover page may be 14 or 12.

8.10.4. Font Size for Footnotes: 10; text of footnotes should be single-spaced (1.0.)

8.10.5. Margin: 1 Inch margin on each side of the A4 size page.

8.10.6. Quotations of sources of 50 words or more in any part of the memorial should be block quoted and must be in *italics*.

8.10.7. The participating teams should include Header and footer in their memorials to the effect that the Header should mention the full Name of Competition and the Footer should mention the side on whose behalf memorial is submitted along with Page Number at Bottom Centre of the Page.

8.10.8. The teams should mention their team Codes on the Top Right corner of their Cover page in their written submissions.

8.11. The Footnotes must follow the 19th Bluebook format of citation.

8.12. The Memorial must be Spiral bound

8.13. The Cover Page of the Memorial must have the following colour scheme:

Blue: Plaintiff/ Appellant Cover Page

Red: Defendant/ Respondent Cover Page.

8.14. The Memorial must not contain any Annexure/ Photographs/ Sketches/ exhibits/ Affidavits etc.

8.15. The Memorial will carry a maximum of 100 marks and there will be a separate prize for Best Memorial. As the Memorials shall be utilized to the extent of 30% (The Memorial Marks will carry 30% of weight-age and the oral submissions will carry 70% weight-age of the total evaluation. Memorial Marks shall also be utilized to break any tie arising from the preliminary rounds), they will be scaled to 300 marks for facilitating calculation and clarity.

8.16. **Parameters for judging the Memorials are:**

- Knowledge of Facts and Law.
- Proper and Articulate analysis, Clarity and Organisation.
- Extent of Research
- Grammar and Style.
- Correct Format and Citation
- Understanding essential Legal Issues presented
- Clear, Neat, Concise and Unambiguous Writing Style.
- Integration of facts into legal argument.
- Effective use of authority to support Argument

9. INAUGURATION AND DRAW OF LOTS

The inauguration of the All India Moot Court Competition shall be held on 9th March 2018 followed by the draw of lots. The draw of lots for the preliminary rounds will take place on the same day after the registration formalities are complete. All the teams are required to be present for the draw of lots without fail.

10. ORAL PLEADING

There will be one Preliminary round of argument divided into two parts, a quarter finals, a semi finals and a final round.

10.1. **Preliminary Rounds:** every participating team shall take part in the preliminary round as per the lots drawn are announced. This round will consist of two sessions and the participating teams will have an opportunity to argue for both sides. In each of the session the respective teams will be assigned either side i.e., plaintiff/appellant or defendant/respondent depending on the draw of lots. Each team will face different opponents in both the rounds and shall necessarily plead from both sides. Each team will be given a total of 30 minutes to present their case which includes rebuttal and sur-rebuttal. The division of time between the speakers is at the discretion of the team members, subject to a maximum of 15 minutes per speaker. Each team shall communicate to the court-clerk about their allocation of 30 minutes. Top eight teams on their cumulative marks scored in oral presentation as well as in the written submission shall be qualified for the quarter final rounds. In case of tie, the team with higher marks in memorial will proceed to the quarter finals. No researcher of any team will be permitted to speak but would be allowed to communicate with his/her team members in a discreet manner.

10.2. **Quarter Finals:** the qualifying teams shall argue only one side in the quarter finals and the side to be represented by the team shall be determined by way of draw of lots. Each team shall get a total of 30 minutes to present their case. The time includes rebuttal and sur-rebuttal. The division of time between the speakers is at the discretion of the team members subject to a maximum of 15 minutes per speaker. Each team shall communicate to the court-clerk about their allocation of 30 minutes. The teams to be qualified for the semi finals shall be selected on the basis of “Knockout Round”. Four teams shall advance to the semi final rounds.

10.3. **Semi-Final Rounds:** Each team shall get a total of 30 minutes to present their case. The time includes rebuttal and sur-rebuttal. The division of time between



the speakers is at the discretion of the team members subject to a maximum of 17 minutes per speaker. Each team shall communicate to the court- clerk about their allocation of 30 minutes. On the basis of knock out round two teams shall advance to the finals.

10.4. **Final Round:** each team shall get a time of 45 minutes to present their case. The time includes rebuttal and sur-rebuttal. The division of time between the speakers is at the discretion of the team members subject to the maximum of twenty five minutes per speaker. Each qualifying team shall communicate to the court-clerk about their allocation of 45 minutes. No team shall reserve more than 5 minutes for rebuttals.

10.5. **Anonymity:** participants may introduce themselves to the court by his individual code. However, the team's college should not be mentioned at any time. Further, all team members, coaches, advisors and observers shall refrain from identifying a team's school/college at any time and in any manner, including, but not limited to, wearing and carrying any identifying items, such as badges, blazers, or pins or carrying identifying material such as books with college logo or college seal.

10.6. MARKING FOR ORAL PLEADING

1. Understanding the facts, law and procedure.
2. Application of law to the facts of the case.
3. Logical flow of arguments.
4. Ability to explain legal principles clearly.
5. Ingenuity and ability to answer.
6. Style, poise, courtesy and demeanor.
7. Reference to the memorials.
8. Time management.

11. PENALTY

Notwithstanding anything written as a part of the above mentioned rules, the following penalties shall be levied on the participants:

- 11.1. The hard copies must be exact print outs of the soft copies. Non-compliance with this rule would entail disqualification.
- 11.2. Soft copy of memorials submitted after the stipulated time will attract a penalty of one mark for each hour of delay and two marks for each subsequent day of delay, subject to prior notification and approval.
- 11.3. Hard copy of memorials submitted after the stipulated time will attract a penalty of two marks for each day of delay subject to prior notification and approval.
- 11.4. Memorials exceeding the length of 40 A4 size pages shall be subjected to deduction of marks.
- 11.5. Non-compliance with the rules mentioned in rule 8 will attract deduction of marks.

12. SCOUTING

- 12.1. Teams will not be allowed to observe the orals of any other teams. Scouting is strictly prohibited. Scouting by any of the team members will result in immediate disqualification. The organizers decision will be final in this regard.
- 12.2. The researchers shall sit with the orators at the time of the orals and shall not attend the court sessions of any other team participating in the competition.

Al-Ameen College of Law, Bangalore, shall have the right to assert copyright over the memorials of the teams that has received any of the prizes and reserve the right to publish the winning memorials after appropriate editing.

16. **ACCOMMODATION, FOOD AND TRANSPORT**

16.1. **Accommodation and Transport-**

- Accommodation shall be provided only to the outstation teams on the days of the competition only **9th to 11th March 2018 only**. It shall be extended to the members of the team only (maximum three).
- The local teams shall not be provided with accommodation or travel assistance.
- The organizers shall be providing separate accommodation for boys and girls.
- Teams shall be responsible for any/all damages caused by tem during their stay.
- Teams desiring to reach early or depart late must make their own arrangement for staying earlier/beyond the time stipulated above.

16.2. **FOOD:**

- Food shall be provided to all teams only on three days of the competition.

17. **CODE OF CONDUCT**

All the participants must behave in a dignified manner and not cause any inconvenience to the organizers. Any participant found misbehaving with other participant or volunteers will be disqualified immediately. Deference to the judges of the moot court competition must be maintained inside and outside the court hall.

Participants will be entirely disqualified from the competition on the following grounds:

- A. If found smoking or consuming/carrying drugs or alcohol in the campus or place of accommodation.
- B. If found misbehaving, or causing nuisance or making abusive statements, showing disrespect towards judges, co-participants or members of the host institution.



18. ORGANIZERS POWERS:

- 18.1. All participants are expected to maintain decorum in the court during the competition and are expected to conduct themselves in a manner befitting the legal profession. The organizers reserve the right to take appropriate action for any unethical, unprofessional and immoral conduct.
- 18.2. The organizers decision as regards the interpretation of rules or any other matter related to the competition will be final and binding.
- 18.3. If there is any situation which is not contemplated in the rules, the organizers decision on the same shall be final and binding.
- 18.4. The organizers reserve the right to vary, alter, modify or repeal any of the above rules without any prior notification, if so required and as they may deem appropriate.
